Big thank you to the Warm Space volunteers

We have some amazing people in our two villages. People who care about the health and well-being of their friends and neighbours, particularly those who are less fortunate than others and need a little support now and again.

One recent example of fantastic volunteering is the Warm Space lunches that ran throughout the winter months and ended at the end of March. During the six months over 2,720 meals were served, mostly to those who came along to the lunches to enjoy the food, keep warm and socialise, but of these, 350 were delivered to the homes of those unable to get to the Village Hall.

Most of food served was prepared and donated by the volunteers but some had to be purchased using cash donated at each lunch. But a staggering $\pounds1,700$ was raised and given to seventeen local charities and a further $\pounds1,200$, in the form of cash or groceries, was distributed to villagers thought to need a bit of help.

So, a big thank you to Karen and Malcolm Morley, Linda Carver, Richard Byas, Linda Robinson, Jane Burnett, Julie Coldbeck, Chris Bailey and Amanda Graham...and of course, to everyone who attended lunches or contributed in any way whatsoever.

Topcliffe Parish Council

At the Annual General Meeting of Topcliffe parish Council held last month the chairman, Cllr Jamie Moores, reported that 2022/23 had been an extremely busy year, with lots happening in the village. Key issues reported were:

Open Spaces

Sheep Wash: Cllr Ben Collard has continued work to maintain and improve this invaluable resource. It is now a pleasant place to visit.

Playing Field: The Parish Council formally took ownership of the playing field from Hambleton District Council during the year. Our former local councillor, Mark Robson, was instrumental in achieving this. He and his wife Alex, who is Clerk to the Parish Council, also led on obtaining £95,000 funding for improvements to the playing field and work will start on site in June. There'll be new play equipment, better access via a new path and provision of new village allotments. Topcliffe resident John Pearson obtained several hundred small trees from the Woodland Trust which will be planted around the borders of the playing field.

Winn Lane Cemetery: Josh Barningham was commissioned to cut back and tidy the trees and hedges and his work has greatly improved the cemetery.

Community Projects

Jubilee Party in the Park: Financial support for the event was provided by the Parish Council. The event was a brilliant success thanks mainly to the team of organisers, particularly Jenny Bumby and John and Marie Pearson, who worked tirelessly to make it all work.

Topcliffe Warm Space: Although the Parish Council was not directly involved, it did support a bid for financial assistance from Hambleton District Council. The community-inspired project has been a huge success and Karen and Malcolm Morley, Linda Carver and other volunteers are to be congratulated on creating a social event that has proven very popular with residents and has raised considerable funds for local charities and to support residents in need.

Topcliffe Village Website: Traffic to the village website continues to grow year on year and is now averaging 200 to 250 hits each month. This is pleasing because operating the website, which is part of the legal responsibilities of the Parish Council, is relatively costly. The Village Hall now makes use of the site as the doorway to its Hallmaster booking system and the site is available to other community groups.

Village HGV Traffic

The amount of HGV traffic in both Topcliffe and Asenby continues to be a major concern for both villages. The Parish Council has been very active representing this view to both local and national highway authorities and to the local planning department when plans for Dalton developments were proposed. Our aim is to seek action to reduce the levels of vehicles passing through our villages.

The Parish Council has secured over £120,000 from the developers of Dalton 49 to help mitigate traffic problems as the industrial estate grows. The money is now starting to flow and more will arrive as the development proceeds.

Initially new and better HGV signage has been installed at the Asenby and Dalton ends of the villages. National Highways has designed and commissioned new signage for the A168 dual carriageway, but has yet to provide an installation date.

Highways/Trading Standards have no resources for enforcement of the village's weight restriction zone but have agreed that parish councillors and other volunteers can undertake enforcement exercises, which started recently and will take place weekly.

Highways rejected the Parish Council's proposal to move the weight restriction limit nearer to Topcliffe but have agreed to review it in six months. Cllr Roy Beckwith and Tony Bruce have been key drivers of this long-term project and both have indicated they will continue to put a significant amount of time and effort into this.

North Yorkshire Council

North Yorkshire has just seen the biggest reorganisation of local authorities for many years. The Parish Council had always enjoyed very close working relationships with many parts of Hambleton District Council, which we have now lost. Significant effort will need to be put in to establish new working relationships within the new North Yorkshire Council

Handbags and Gladrags

The song played at the beginning of the funeral service for 50-year young Ben Lowe was entirely appropriate. It summed up his love of life and his enthusiasm for pop music and dancing. Handbags and Gladrags by the Stereophonics was also the song played for the first dance when Ben married Lesley back in 2017.

Ben died suddenly whilst at work on 20 March and his funeral, which was attended by hundreds of family members, friends and neighbours, was held at Maple Park Crematorium.

Ben was born on the 29 August 1972, two months premature, weighing just 5lbs 2oz. He was born with jaundice so he was kept in intensive care for a month, however in spite of this difficult start, he grew into a strong, upright and healthy young man.



In 1982 the family moved from Marple near Stockport to Asenby and Ben went to Topcliffe Primary and Thirsk Secondary schools, where he made life-long friendships. He went to university in Hull initially and then in Newcastle. It was during his time at Newcastle University that he met Lesley, the true love of his life, who was studying nursing there.

They lived in Harrogate for a short while and then moved into their forever home in Asenby and renovated it together. They enjoyed a very long courtship from 1995 to 2017, when, on New Year's Day, Ben went down on one knee and asked Lesley to marry him. They married at Solberge Hall in September 2017 and had a fabulous honeymoon in

Canada, travelling on The Rocky Mountaineer to Vancouver and then cruising up to Alaska. They then had a romantic second honeymoon in Venice.

Ben idolised his two boys - Adam and Isaac. His life was about his family and he worked so hard to give them a good life, including wonderful holidays and weekend breaks, often with their friends Lesley and Sean and Jackie and Alec and their children. Ben had an capacity amazing to make everyone happy and to make life fun. He was also famous for his dance moves, swinging people round and off their feet, laughing hugely whilst doing this.

Ben had his own business, Swale Fencing, which was renowned for first class workmanship and reliability and that accolade was all down to his professionalism, attention to detail and hard work.

One of Ben's greatest loves was motorbikes and AI, his lifelong friend and workmate, shared this passion. They loved road trips riding around 'God's beautiful Country' - North Yorkshire.

Ben was a real gentleman in every sense of the word and is hugely missed by all who knew and loved him. Lesley, Adam and Isaac, parents Judith and Peter, and Ben's brother and sister Will and Sally say that they were overwhelmed by the very many cards and messages they received and want to take this opportunity to thank everyone, it meant a lot to them.

The Angel though the ages

The Angel Inn at Topcliffe is closed for a major refurbishment and it's going to be the autumn before it re-opens. So, this is a good time to look back at the pub's history and to remind us all that The Angel has always been at the centre of village life and constantly changed and developed over the years.



The old photographs accompanying this article show the remarkable changes over the years, and now we can look forward to possibly the most significant era in the pub's everchanging life.

As long ago as 1797 The Angel was listed in a manorial survey as a brick and thatched public house managed by Abraham Peacock. It had a separate brew house, a thatched barn, a range of stables, pig sties and storage areas.

Manorial surveys dated in the mid-19th century show that the tenancy was held by Catherine Leadley in 1867 and before her by John Jackson (Snr). In the early twentieth century, landlady Sarah Gill, advertised The Angel as "the old coaching house" with five bedrooms and two guest sitting rooms.

Most locals who have been regulars at The Angel will remember with great fondness the late 1990s when Tony

and Trish Ardron were proprietors. They expanded the business and had a very welcoming style, provided excellent food and created a homely atmosphere that locals and visitors alike thoroughly enjoyed. Their departure led to a decade of decline and considerable uncertainty, which only ended when Richard Sykes arrived on the scene in 2014. Under the banner of West Park Inns, The Angel once again lived up to its promise with the bar, restaurant, entertainment suite, bedrooms and garden attracting plenty of business.



The massive refurbishment now underway promises a new eating and drinking experience, though regulars will still be able to call it their local and there'll be good pub grub available. Dave and Maggie Mathews, together

with their daughter Rose and son-in-law Jack, have ripped the kitchens, bar and restaurant apart and a major refit is now taking place. Later phases of work will see a replacement Plaza entertainment suite, spa with swimming pool, staff accommodation block...all built to the highest quality. The existing 16 guest bedrooms will be modernised, the existing Plaza Suite will be converted into more bedroom accommodation and there are exciting plans for a garden and outside bar make-over.

All these plans will see The Angel transformed into a first-class venue that will compete with the best in this part of North Yorkshire.

Commemorative Flagstaff

Andrew Eckersley gives an update on his idea for a commemorative flagpole in Topcliffe.

"There seems to be more support than initially indicated for the village to commemorate the reign of our late Queen Elizabeth II and the Coronation of King Charles III.

"I am happy to progress the flagpole project and have acknowledged the few objections to the plan, most based on either cost or location.

"I had suggested a site at the Cross near the Post Office, but that could prove more difficult than I initially imagined. There are a few other possible locations and all have associated merit and problems (highways approval, for example). My new preferred location is near the vehicular entrance to The Angel car park, just in front of the large hedge. Like the Cross site, this is a very central village location. The Village Hall Committee has also offered the hall grounds as a possible location and Jubilee Gardens is also a potential location.

"Topcliffe Parish Council is totally supportive of the idea and I am sure the cost initially quoted can be reduced significantly if the project becomes a community effort. The village has a mine of skilled people of many disciplines, many of whom might be willing to help with the project in some small (or big) way."

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
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Major Kevin Young MBE: a military legend

News of the passing of Kevin Young aged just 64 has shocked our community and the military world, which he was a part of for 43 years. Kev died very suddenly on Saturday 22 April.

Kev was born in Sunderland in 1958, the middle of five children. After school, he had no intention of joining the army, but one day whilst walking past the local army recruitment centre he decided to join up, and he took the papers home for his parents to sign. Kev went into basic training in Woolwich on his 17th birthday and that was the start of his 43-year army career. He had a distinguished career with important roles at bases across the UK and operational service in Northern Ireland, Bosnia, Kosovo and Iraq, plus military exercises across the globe.

His military colleagues always spoke extremely highly of him and at the funeral Major General (Retired) Matthew Sykes CVO, said he was one of the best Regimental Sergeant Majors his regiment had ever had.

One appointment that showcased Kev's breadth of talent was Families Officer with the 4th Regiment which was about to begin the first of several tours of duty in Afghanistan. Tragically the regiment suffered the loss of three men within a 6-week period, one being a close friend of Kev and his wife Lorna. But in the most testing of times, Kev remained utterly professional.

Kev finished his career in 2013 as the Officer Commanding the Personnel Recovery Centre at Phoenix House, Catterick.

It was during Kev's 1976 deployment in Belfast that he met Lorna, the love of his life who was a serving member of the Royal Ulster Constabulary. Kev and Lorna were married in Belfast in January 1979 and that was the beginning of 44 wonderful years of marriage. He and Lorna settled in Topcliffe in 2001 and Kev quickly became a popular member of the community - always positive, cheerful, helpful, and always impeccably dressed.

In the 2012 New Year Honours' List, Kev was awarded an MBE for his services as Families Officer and in June 2013

he received his MBE medal from Her Majesty the Queen at Buckingham Palace. He was accompanied by a very proud Lorna and equally proud children Lyn and David.

A true gentleman, Kev was highly respected by everyone who knew him, especially those who served with him, played football and golf with him, were involved with him in his many charitable efforts... and those who simply knew him as a friend and neighbour.

Kev had a full military funeral with honours at a packed St Mary's Church in Thirsk.

Lorna, Lyn and David have drawn great comfort from the hundreds of cards and messages they have received and thank everyone for all the kindness they have been shown.

The weekend also featured a celebration of the beauty,

poetry and majesty of the Book of Common Prayer as re-issued for use in church in 1662. Expert lain Milne, of the Prayer Book Society gave a fascinating talk '1662 and All That'.



Blister pack recycling locally

Are you hoping to be more green this year and boost your recycling? Well now you can do a little bit more by saving your medical blister packs...and you can do it locally in Topcliffe.

The scheme is run by Superdrug and they will take blister packs from brands such as Anadin, Panadol, Paracetamol, Ibuprofen, Nexium, Piriteze, Rennie, Nicorette, Imodium, Sudafed and Benadryl.

But you don't have to go far to join this scheme as Topcliffe residents Heather Holt and Kim Hughes have set up a collection point at their home at 4 Dovecote Mews.

They have placed a bin next to their log store at the front of their house and you can deposit blister packs there at any time.

So, start collecting empty medicine blisters today and when you have a few, simply drop them off at your local dedicated collection point.

The Flying Oysters raise Village Hall roof

The dance night at the Village Hall featuring The Flying Oysters - reputed to be one of the best bands in the North of England - was a sell-out and an amazingly successful evening.
