

Eco warriors take action on the environment

School children at Topcliffe Academy have been undertaking a wide range of activities aimed at helping the environment and highlighting the threat that thoughtless actions can have on our lives, our local community and the wider world.

In a project called 'Changemakers', each class identified action they could take that would benefit the community and reflect the school's values - community, compassion, friendship and trust.

Topcliffe Parish Council Update

1. Dalton Industrial Estate

The Dalton 49 proposed industrial estate expansion was, as expected, approved at the Hambleton District Council planning meeting on 24 September. Parish councillors presented the village's concerns about increased HGV traffic, which was well received and supported by the planning committee. There is a full report on the home page of the village website at (www.topcliffe.org.uk). Briefly, the plan has had a number of legally enforceable conditions added and approved which includes improved signage, a traffic plan which will be made clear to all new tenants and a £50,000 bond to be used for extra surveillance, monitoring, enforcement and, if necessary, traffic cameras.

Inspired Pet Nutrition (IPN), the pet food business already established on Dalton Industrial Estate, has applied for permission to significantly expand its current operation. It is clear from their traffic study that this will result in a significant increase in HGV traffic on a daily basis. The study suggests that there is no reason for HGV traffic to travel through our village, but we know from our current experience that this is highly unlikely to be the case. We have responded to IPN and the planners expressing our serious concern and asking that legally enforceable conditions, similar to those for Dalton 49, be included in any approval. Our submission has the full support of our district councillors. Again, more details are available on the village website home page.

2. Amendment of existing Weight Restriction Zones

After representations by the Parish Council to North Yorkshire Highways a proposal to move the current weight restricted zone limit from the Busby Stoop roundabout to the edge of the village has finally been agreed and been offered for public consultation. The consultation period ended a few weeks ago and we are now awaiting the final decision from Highways. Our own monitoring of HGV traffic suggests that around 70% of HGV passages emanates from companies located along this stretch of the A167 - which is currently legal. If approved this revised zoning would result in such traffic becoming illegal and we should see a drastic reduction of offenders.

3. Enforcement action on Illegal HGV traffic

Part of the Parish Council's recent efforts to reduce illegal HGV traffic has been to instigate prosecutions of offenders via the local authorities. This is a two-pronged attack which, after several initial technical setbacks and delays, is starting to show results.

Operation Spartan - this is a police-operated scheme whereby we follow and dashcam-record HGV passages from entry to exit of the weight restricted zone. We then submit the recordings to the police, with appropriate documentation and statements, for them to follow up. To date one submission has resulted in a prosecution with two others in process.

Trading Standards tracking - we are working with Trading Standards who have set up three separate days of tracking HGV passages. They use a different system whereby their officers are stationed at each of the three current restricted zone entry/exit points and time HGV

passages. Again, early progress was delayed due to technical hitches but, on their last outing, they recorded four transgressors which are now being processed towards prosecution. They have also committed to continuing these activities subject to their resources and budgets.

As and when prosecutions occur, we will be publicising them as widely as possible, so that the HGV fraternity will become aware that passing through the Topcliffe weight restricted zone will result in prosecution and fines.

These may seem small figures compared with the number of HGV passages that we see daily, but the vast majority of those tracked are turning off to bases along the A167 between Topcliffe school and Busby Stoop roundabout - which, as mentioned above, is quite legal. If approved the revised enforcement zone would dramatically reduce illegal HGVs.

4. Topcliffe Tidy Day

Thanks to everyone who came out in the cold and drizzle to help with the village tidy up organised by councillors Malcolm Morley and Ben Collard. We had an excellent turn out from villagers who, among other things, painted the roadside fencing from the Swan to the school; washed road signs; weeded gutters; cut back unwanted growth in Jubilee Gardens; and generally litter picked. As well as the satisfaction of having a clean and tidy village, all the



Class action for the environment

On the front page we report on how young children in Ash class at Topcliffe Academy organised a litter pick as their 'Changemaker' project on the impact we all have on the environment. Here's information about the action other classes are taking:

Seedlings (ages 2 to 4) and Willow (ages 4 to 5)

These youngsters met together to hear all about hedgehogs from local expert Helen Smith and were alarmed to find out that these charming little beasts are in decline and need our help. They decided they would all come to school dressed up as woodland creatures to raise money to purchase a hedgehog house for the school grounds. They also made a short video for parents telling them how they can help the hedgehogs in their own gardens.

Silver Birch (ages 7 to 9)

This class has been learning about the importance of bees for pollination and for making honey. Local bee

expert Rachel Tyreman of Asenbee Honey visited the school to talk about her passion for bees and to explain what it takes to be a beekeeper. The class also wrote to MP Kevin Hollinrake, outlining the devastating impact of declining bee populations and what can be done within our community to sustain bee numbers. The children also decided to make posters and campaign videos to share their new knowledge with others.

Maple (ages 9 to 11)

The children in Maple class are extremely concerned about the speed of traffic passing the school and going through the village generally. So, they enlisted help from Topcliffe Parish Council, which put a monitoring device up on the roadside leading into Topcliffe from Busby Stoop, to gather data about how fast traffic was going. They tracked vehicle movements and recorded trends, as well as gathering research data and completing tally charts to monitor the volume of traffic - with some astonishing results.

The children have sent a persuasive letter to the Hambleton District Council, North Yorkshire Police and our local MP, Kevin Hollinrake, asking for the speed limit near the school to be reduced from 30 mph to 20mph.

Coffee Mornings Success

Two coffee mornings held recently to raise funds for Macmillan Cancer Support were an enormous success. Lois and Julian Hooker of Manor Close, Topcliffe raised £508 and the Parker family of Asenby raised over £1,000. That's a tremendous effort by all involved, so a big thank you is offered to everyone who gave their support.



In the last edition of The Tattler I mentioned that the Thirsk & Sowerby Leisure Centre was due to reopen following a massive makeover costing £4 million. In the couple of months the centre has been open the people of Hambleton have visited in their thousands and surveys have shown that the revamped facility is just what the doctor ordered! The multi-million investment in this essential community facility shows the council's commitment to improving and developing the Thirsk area, giving residents easy access to facilities that can benefit their health and wellbeing.

Finally, I am pleased to announce that for four weeks, from 1 December to 4 January, the district council is making car parking free at its car parks across Hambleton, giving the local economy a massive festive boost. I hope that suspending parking charges in the build up to and immediately after Christmas will encourage residents to use the shops, restaurants and cafes our market towns offer for both Christmas shopping and festive trips out.

On Sunday 12 December the 88th Sunday Email will be published and circulated to over 300 recipients, mainly in Topcliffe and Asenby but with some going further afield.

The Sunday Email was launched on 4 April 2020, a week after the first Covid lockdown was introduced. It was an attempt to help circulate information about Covid, the restrictions and how important services - health and everyday needs - could be accessed. Over the months, whilst continuing to present important Covid-related information, the email morphed into a general newsletter with news of local activities and events.

Although only 65 to 70% of recipients actually open the weekly email, it still means that around 180 residents value it sufficiently to read, or at least glance through, its contents...making its continued publication worthwhile.
