Voters need photo ID

If you are intending to vote in May's local election you will need to be able to show photo ID to the polling clerks. A passport, driving licence or bus pass is acceptable.

If you don't have one of these accepted photo IDs, you can apply for a free voter ID document, which is known as a Voter Authority Certificate. You can do this online at www.electoralcommission.org.uk or by getting in touch with the Electoral Services Office at North Yorkshire Council at www.northyorks.gov.uk/your-council/elections-and-voting or by visiting the council's office in Northallerton. You will need a recent digital photograph and your National Insurance number.

The deadline to apply for free voter ID for the election on Thursday 2 May is 5pm on Wednesday 24 April.

Garden Waste Collection Service

This month sees the restart of the garden waste collection service by North Yorkshire Council. It now costs £46.50 for fortnightly collections between March and early December. Customers whose previous licence covered collections to March 2024 will pay a reduced fee of £42.

The licence is for one 240-litre wheelie bin to be emptied fortnightly, though more than one licence can be purchased. Once paid, you will receive a licence pack by post within 14 days. This pack will include a sticker that must be displayed on your bin - and your service will not start until your licence is displayed.

Collections can start as early as 6am on your collection day, so your bin should be at the kerbside or designated collection point, with the licence clearly visible, from the night before.

Only the following garden waste will be accepted - cut flowers, plants and weeds, grass cuttings, hay and straw (no used animal bedding), hedge clippings, leaves and bark, small branches or prunings and windfall fruit from your garden. In January Christmas trees chopped up small will be collected.

The following should not be placed in garden bins - ash, cardboard or paper, disposable nappies, food waste (including fruit and vegetable peelings), general household rubbish, pet waste, plant pots, plastic bags (including compostable or biodegradable bags), rubble, soil, stones, turf or wood.

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Topcliffe Parish Council Update

<u>Front Street Sewage Smells:</u> Yorkshire Water has finally accepted responsibility for the problem affecting many residents in Front Street. The company has agreed a temporary solution for the next six months and during that time they will agree and action a permanent solution. So far, the temporary solution appears to be working, but parish councillors will monitor the situation closely over the coming months.

Our MP Kevin Hollinrake and his team along with our new North Yorkshire Councillor Dan Sladden, have provided significant help in achieving this positive result.

<u>Speeding in Topcliffe:</u> Speeding in the village is still a major concern for many residents. Data from the radar speed sign near the school indicates that both traffic volume and speeds are increasing. In the coming weeks we will collect data from Long Street so that we have a full picture from both ends of the village.

Through Councillor Dan Sladden the Parish Council has asked for an increased police speed camera presence in the village. The police have said they are willing to do this but there is insufficient space for parking their van, which means they can only utilise their limited number of police camera bikes (just two for the whole of North Yorks). Councillors are investigating solutions for this.

Once funding can be found, we also intend to purchase and install another radar speed sign for Long Street, so that there's one at each end of the village all the time. Hopefully, this should be before the end of summer.

<u>Winn Lane Cemetery:</u> New gates constructed by Simon Parker of Topcliffe-based, Parker Oak, have recently been installed at the entrance to the cemetery...and several people have commented that they "look fantastic".

A large dead tree at the rear of the cemetery has recently had to be removed for safety reasons.

HGV Traffic: The problem of HGV traffic through Topcliffe and Asenby continues and is slowly increasing as the Dalton 49 development grows. Again, the Parish Council has had significant help and advice from Kevin Hollingrake MP and also from our new North Yorkshire councillor, Dan Sladden, is very much on board.

North Yorkshire Council officers say all the right things, but our feeling is they are doing their best to avoid doing anything at all, other than provide new signage. We know funding is a major issue for the authority but in our case, the Parish Council has secured approximately £125,000 from the Dalton 49 development specifically for mitigating this issue and we intend to make sure the funding is spent on this problem.

Volunteer enforcement teams the Parish Council has set up have submitted over 30 incidents of illegal HGV traffic for prosecution by the Trading Standards Department. Unfortunately, the process has proved to be painfully slow but at a recent meeting officers assured us that they are working on prosecution and/or warnings relating to our submissions. That said, the fact is that so far only one driver has been prosecuted.

The Parish Council will continue to submit evidence from our teams and would welcome any volunteers who have the time to come and help.

Thank you! It's such an honour to have been elected to represent the community I live in, and the many messages of congratulations and support I've received have been heart-warming.

The last three months have been a whirlwind of meetings with residents and community groups, as well as getting to know my new colleagues on North Yorkshire Council.

An unexpected pleasure has been allocating the unspent portion of my Locality Budget and I'm pleased that £800 is going to the Thistle Hill Golf Club, based at Alanbrooke Barracks, to help refurbish its mowers. I have a new budget of £10,000 to allocate over the next year so please get in touch with ideas.

I've already had productive meetings with Topcliffe Parish councillors on various issues affecting the village, including speeding and HGVs. On the former, I'm working with the police to review what can be done and

on the latter, I joined a useful meeting with North Yorkshire Council to make sure they and the village's local volunteer enforcers can work together in the best way to see a reduction in the number of weight limit infringements.

responded several complaints from residents about the state of roads and pavements. We all know how bad they are in some places and I want to keep hearing about them. The good news is that the pavements on Long Street are scheduled for maintenance over the coming year, so you should see an improvement there soon.

I intend to stay in touch with you all year round - not just at election time. 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The Devil's Arrows, Boroughbridge

(Adapted from an article written by Richard Byas and published in the Cross Talk newsletter in February 2024)

We are very fortunate in North Yorkshire to have a number of fascinating ancient monuments, some of which date back to the prehistoric era.

In the Spring 2023 edition of The Tattler there was an article about the Thornborough Henges which are located near West Tanfield. But there's another significant set of ancient stones nearer to Topcliffe and Asenby - at Boroughbridge.

Known as the Devil's Arrows and situated off Roecliffe Lane near where the A1 crosses the

River Ure at Boroughbridge, the three huge stones are composed of millstone grit and likely to have originated from Plumpton Rocks, nine miles away near Knaresborough.

The legendary explanation for their existence recounts that the Devil fired arrows from Howe Hill south of Fountains Abbey towards the Christian settlement at

Aldborough, but the arrows fell short, landing in a line in the Boroughbridge field.

It's believed that originally there were five or more stones dating from the Bronze Age. It's unclear what happened to most stones but in an early sixteenth century publication it was stated that one was lost when it was

uprooted by treasure hunters and later used as the base for a nearby bridge over a stream.


The tallest stone stands at 22 feet 6 inches high, making it the tallest menhir in Britain after the



Rudston Monolith in the East Riding of Yorkshire which measures 25 feet in height.

The stones are heavily weathered and fluted at their peaks. The outer stones are 200 and 370 feet away from the central stone and form an alignment that is almost straight, running NNW-SSE. It is understood that they may have been arranged to align with the southernmost summer moonrise.

The fair of St. Barnabas was held near the stones on Midsummer's Day until the 18th century.

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Village Hall Water Leak

Things are now back to normal at Topcliffe and Asenby Village Hall but the first six weeks of 2024 proved to be a bit of a nightmare after a water leak created huge problems.

It all started when close to £7,000 was taken by direct debit from the Village Hall's bank account as the charge for the last quarter of the year. The normal charge is closer to £100, so it was obvious, at least to the committee, that something was dramatically wrong.

Yorkshire Water were asked to visit to help identify the leak but as it was within the boundary of the hall the company said it was not their responsibility. They did arrive early January to check the meter and suggested it was in good working order. That later proved not to be the case.

TWC Drain Care arrived on site and quickly proved that there was a leak somewhere under the terrace at the front of the hall. Exploratory holes were dug but the actual leak continued to be illusive. The committee were faced with the prospect of digging more holes and trenches that would have destroyed the terrace, steps and flower beds.

So, an alternative solution was sought and it was agreed that a completely new water supply system would be installed. This solution simply by-passed the leak, isolating it from any water supply.

The problem at this point was that TWC could not proceed whilst the water supply was still turned on at the meter. Committee members had shown that the stopcock at the meter was broken and the water could not be turned off.

They reported this to Yorkshire Water but initially were rebuffed by arguments that it was not their responsibility. But committee members persisted and over a week four appointments were made and broken, wasting much time of committee members and contractors. After instigating Yorkshire Water's complaints procedure, progress was finally achieved on Friday 26 January when a team arrived and took five minutes to identify that the stopcock on the meter was indeed broken and they replaced it.

That meant the major work to replace the water supply could begin...but in the meanwhile TWC had had to leave the site to fulfil other commitments elsewhere. Work at the Village Hall had to be fitted in to their schedule over the next few weeks. The main works were completed by 9 February, though some cosmetic work took a little longer.

All of this created a major operational difficulty for the Village Hall Committee and the hall's users. The hall could not operate without an effective water supply or whilst contractors were digging holes all over the entrance area. So, weeks of bookings had to be cancelled, creating major difficulties for many of the organisations that regularly use the hall. The committee has been impressed with the patience and understanding all users have shown over this period and wishes to thank them all and hope they will settle back in now that it is service as usual.

Financially it has been a very worrying time for the committee, but it's hoped that the costs associated with the leak - the excess water consumption, repairs, as well as the loss of income - will be recovered from the hall's insurers.
