

Asenby Says Goodbye To Its Oldest Resident

Peter Halliday, who died recently at his home in Asenby, celebrated his 100th birthday in early 2013 with the arrival of a birthday card from the Queen. The card was one of many for the man who had spent nearly all of his many years in the village.

His parents and their nine childen lived at the cobbler's shop, later moving to the blacksmith's shop when he was two. He attended Topcliffe School until he was 15 when he left Yorkshire to work for Lord Roseberry of Mentmore in Buckinghamshire, spending seven years as a gardener, then three years as a chauffeur.

He returned home to work in the blacksmith's shop in Asenby until he was called up to serve in the Second World War, when he became chauffeur to an army officer. On his discharge he returned to the blacksmith's shop where he continued to work until 1990.

Mr Halliday never married but, having been born into a large family, he was never short of visitors. A keen reader of the newspaper and an avid lover of crosswords, friends, neighbours and relatives enabled him to keep his independence at his home in Asenby.

Those Cameras Are Working!

If you are planning to drive north through the A1's 12 mile stretch of road works between Leeming Bar and Barton, then stick to the 50 mph speed limit and don't be tempted by others that are overtaking you.

Some 1,392 motorists have incurred speeding offences according to a report by North Yorkshire Police along this stretch of the A1 which is being upgraded. These cameras measure the speeds of vehicles between EACH camera.

So beware ... don't be one of the 25 motorists each day that are being caught for speeding along this stretch of local highway!

Overwhelming Response To Village Hall Consultation

When the Village Hall Committee launched an evidence-gathering exercise to ask the views of villagers and hall users it never expected such an overwhelming response from local people.

In all, an amazing 189 responses were received and the committee is extremely grateful to everyone who filled in a questionnaire.

This evidence gathered will be used to support applications for grant aid to help us undertake the major improvements to the hall, which were given planning approval by Hambleton Council last July.

Although the comments praised the location of the hall and its size, the results also identified that:

- 80% think that providing new toilet facilities is 'quite' or 'very' important.
- 59% think that creating more storage space is 'quite' or 'very' important.
- 64% think that an improved entrance facility is 'quite' or 'very' important.
- 59% think that an improved access ramp is 'quite' or 'very' important.
- 41% think that improvements to the external frontage is 'quite' or 'very' important.
- 74% think that a total refurbishment of the kitchen is 'quite' or 'very' important.

The consultation also identified that a considerable number of residents would be interested in joining existing activities if the hall is improved, or in joining in a range of new activities, if they are organised. A significant number of people 35 (or 15%) suggested activities that they would be prepared to facilitate.

70% of respondents suggested that they would be prepared to hire the hall for a private function, especially if improvements were undertaken. From the list of suggested facilities that would be likely to benefit most, a large hall and kitchen facilities were most popular, attracting 53% of responses.

Among facilities (in addition to the list above) that residents thought would enhance the hall were: a stage and lighting, internet access, secure cycle parking, baby changing facilities, outside seating and tables, showers, solar panels, lounge/bar and internal marquee.

NOTE: The planned improvements, which are estimated to cost in the region of £100,000, include the construction of a new toilet facilities, conversion of existing toilet areas for storage, new less steep ramp and external planters, much improved entrance and lobby area, plus major enhancements to the external appearance of the building. In addition the kitchen will be totally refurbished.

Of course this includes a range of ages and fitness levels, but once the alterations are complete, we can look to providing more classes not covered by Yoga (gentle and intermediate) on Monday evenings, or Pilates on Monday and Thursday mornings, or indeed indoor carpet bowls on Thursday evenings and Tang Soo Do on Wednesday evenings and Saturday mornings.

Many thought the library was a good idea but may not be aware that it is open on Tues afternoons from 3 - 4.30 pm, or may not realise they can pop into the back room and borrow books when they are in the hall for any other reason.

A very big thank you to those respondents who have offered help in all manner of ways. There will be a drinks and nibbles meeting in February for all these people where we can see how we can best use their efforts. The criteria for eligibility this year has risen to 80 years of age. If you feel you qualify and we have unfortunately not been aware of your status, please do contact us.



North Yorkshire Trading Standards is asking residents to report traders who cold call at local homes in an effort to obtain work.

A spokesperson for Trading Standards said, "We have a zero tolerance approach to cold calling and doorstep crime because we are aware of the detriment that it can cause vulnerable residents."

"Itinerant traders use this approach to take advantage of vulnerable people, often acting aggressively to railroad them into agreeing to over charged and unnecessary work to their homes."

Topcliffe Parish Council News

This year has seen some considerable changes to policy by our local government, requiring not the resolution of in-house financial problems but simply passing some costs onto the Parish Council. particular, NYCC has resolved to cut grass areas only in identified areas for road safety 3 times per year, and consequently removed the grass cutting grant of about £750 which, if the parish wishes to maintain amenity, it will have to make up. HDC have resolved to charge us proportionately for parish elections, even if held at the same time as Parliamentary, County and District elections. This is a change from previous policy. Even if we don't hold parish elections we face a charge of £100. The cost of holding an election would amount to about £1,000, which the parish would have pay over four years

Unfortunately, The Parish Council has regrettably been forced to raise the precept by £800 and will cover the cost of elections from reserves if necessary.

With regard to enforcement of the 7.5 ton weight limit, we have had no response from NYCC, despite suggesting a local help plan, and no support from our council representative at County. I have learned that the improved 4-way A168 junction for the controversial Sowerby Gateway project has been placed on hold, while a revised scheme is put forward by the developers. The reason given, is that no NYCC traffic survey was done and that has now been commissioned. This will take months. I question how a revised amendment can be considered before the results of the survey are known?

On a brighter note, we have had a positive response to a request to extend the 30mph zone out beyond the S bends on Station Road leading out of the village, which is good news.

The Parish Council has also held a site meeting with the installers of the Play Park to see how we might improve it for younger children. The result was that the installers will apply for a grant on our behalf, using their in-house bid team for an additional scheme for toddlers and infants. The outcome should be known in January.

The build up for Magna Carta moves on with an agreed date of Sunday 14th June 2015 as the day of festivities. The PC has applied for £4,500 from the Magna Carta 800th committee to fund some activities and we should know in January if it has been successful. The PC has received a parchment facsimile of Magna Carta (free) from the Magna Carta Barons Association. intended to display this in the church along with the planting of a MC Rose in the churchyard. The PC has purchased some high quality greetings cards, tea towels (yet to arrive) and scrolls displaying Magna Carta and baronial emblems. These are very reasonably priced and will be available for purchase. In the New Year the PC will be setting up a committee to support the celebrations. Anyone wishing to join, please contact a member of the PC.

Looking forward to the elections in May. Please consider standing for Topcliffe Parish Council. If more than five wish to stand, I will gladly step down to make way for new blood and new ideas.

That is a brief roundup of Parish activity and it remains to wish you all joy of the season and a prosperous and healthy New Year.

A Brick In The Hall

Plans are being finalised for a fund raising event with a difference...and it's probably the most ambitious that the Village Hall Committee has ever launched.

The idea is raise funds for village hall improvements by selling individual "bricks".

In the near future, the notice board on the left side of the main hall (as you walk in) will be papered with "brick" wallpaper which depicts foundation, full and half bricks which will be sold at £25, £10 and £5 respectively.

The bricks will be numbered and referenced to a Record Book in which buyers' names will be noted. Buyers will be given a receipt for their numbered brick.

In addition to the static wall of bricks in the village hall, a transportable "wall of bricks" will be created for use at events held elsewhere. Bricks sold will later be marked up on the main wall and recorded in the Record Book.

Once £1,000 has been raised, a draw will be held offering the chance to win prize money totalling £100, based on an agreed percentage for £25, £10 and £5 brick buyers. Similar draws will take place if the scheme is successful and further amounts of £1,000 are raised.

Once the improvements are completed, the name of everyone buying a brick will be listed on a commemorative plaque which will be produced and displayed in the completed village hall.
