The Alanbrooke Concert

The 40th Regiment Royal Artillery held their annual concert at Alanbrooke Barracks on Saturday 14th May, in aid of charities in both North Yorkshire and Scotland.

This year, entertainment was provided by the Lowland Band of the Scottish Division, the children of Thirsk School Choir, The Harrogate Male Voice Choir, the Corps of drums, 1st Battalion the Devonshire and Dorset Regiment and the Pipes & Drums of the 40th Regiment themselves.



The musical theme last year was a journey from the regiment's North Yorkshire home to their recruiting base in the Lowlands of Scotland. This year the theme was War and Peace, which provided an excellent excuse to perform the 1812 Overture again as a first part finale. The large audience were treated to some excellent music, singing (especially the children) and some very talented solo performances.

Refreshments were available at the interval and there also some interesting static displays showing the activities of the Lowland Gunners and their theatres of operation.

This was the fourth charity concert arranged by the regiment since they became based at Topcliffe nearly five years ago. During that time they have raised several thousand pounds for local, national and Army charities thanks to the generous support of the military and the local population.






Brass Rubbings at Baldersby



The Monumental Brass Society will be exhibiting high quality brass rubbings at Baldersby St. James Church between 5th and 13th August 2005. This will be combined with an exhibition of the church's embroidery, of which the church has some exceptionally fine examples.

The exhibition will be opened with a lecture from a leading expert on memorial brasses. During the week, there will be opportunities to try out brass rubbing your self and if you find it thirsty work, refreshments will be served daily.

If you are into monumental brasses, then this is a great opportunity to see some excellent exhibits right on your doorstep. If you're just curious, then why not go along and see what it's all about and try your hand at brass rubbing. Thirsk Festival

Most of you will be well aware that Thirsk Festival takes place between Saturday 2nd and Sunday 10th July. As usual, tickets for the top attractions are selling well and you will be lucky to get seats for Kenny Ball or the Searchers, despite more spaces being available this year.

However, there are still plenty of events worth attending and on Sunday 3rd July there will be a Grand European Tour by young musicians in St. Mary's Church, starting at 7.30 pm. The following day, in the Town Hall and starting at 8 pm the M & EM Dance Company will give a display of various dance styles and there will also be performance from two local dance groups, Thirsk School and Butterflies.

If music and dance is not to your taste, on Tuesday 5th there will be an Antiques Evening with Rory Wardroper (of Tennants) starting at 7.30 pm in the Golden Fleece Hotel. If you like gardening, then maybe you need to be in East Thirsk Community Centre at 7 pm on Wednesday 6th, as the "Thirsk in Bloom" team have arranged to have two one hour sessions of Radio York's "Down to Earth" programme recorded there that evening. ("Down to Earth" is the Radio York version of "Gardener's Question Time".)

As usual the festival will end with Gala days on Saturday 9th and Sunday 10th. A 100 metre aerial ropeway will be erected for those looking for some action and this should go down well with children of all ages. If you prefer to be a spectator, then a Classic Vehicle Rally on the Saturday and "Extreme Team" motorcycle displays on the Sunday should keep you well entertained.

Friarage Hospital

The NHS is working together to look at the best ways of delivering hospital services for the local people of Hambleton and Richmondshire now and in the future.

Already building has begun on the Friarage Hospital's £21 million redevelopment to help provide a modern health service for patients in a warm and welcoming environment. But the reason behind this piece of work, which started 18 months ago, is that across the country the NHS is undergoing massive change affecting how and where services are provided.

Some of these changes are, inevitably, impacting on smaller hospitals such as the Friarage in Northallerton.

They include:

Changes in the number of hours junior doctors work, impacting strongly on services requiring 24-hour cover such as maternity and accident and emergency.

Historically doctors in training provided much of this so if working patterns stay the same, more doctors will be needed to run a 24-hour service.

Recruitment and retention of medical staff as the NHS continues to expand.

Patient access. Patients are having shorter waits for treatment and being given more choice about where and when they receive planned operations and other NHS services.

More advanced treatment. Medical technology is moving forward all the time. New technologies for treatment and diagnosis mean more patients are being treated by specialist doctors in larger, more specialist, hospitals.

Moves towards providing care closer to patients' homes and looking at the potential of providing more hospital care in the community and GP practices.

South Tees Hospitals NHS Trust and Hambleton and Richmondshire Primary Care Trust are currently working together to look at the best ways of sustaining local hospital-run services.

The first phase of this project began last year when NHS staff and members of the public were invited to take part in a number of meetings and workshops.

From these discussions it was agreed further work would be done to look at the best ways of organising services in four key areas – front-of-house (such as accident and emergency and the medical assessment unit), general surgery, anaesthetics, and women and children's services such as obstetrics.

A clinical futures board including NHS staff, patient and public forum representatives and members of the overview and scrutiny committees, has now been set up to oversee this review and look at the best way of safeguarding local health services at the Friarage Hospital and wider community in the long-term.

The board has held its first meeting of the year and further updates and information will be sent out after each meeting and is also available on the trusts' websites on www.Southtees.nhs.uk or www.hrpct.nhs.uk.

Public information meetings

Public information meetings have been held at Thirsk and Richmond in March and at Hawes in May. The last of these meetings will be at Hambleton Forum on Thursday 9th June starting at 7 pm. and if you would like to know more about the changes taking place then please come along and meet those involved.

St. Columba's Tower Re-dedication

A glorious Sunday, 24th April, was the date for the service of Thanksgiving and re-dedication for the restoration of the Church Tower. The service was conducted by the Bishop of Whitby, the right Reverend Robert Ladds and the Vicar of Topcliffe, the Reverend Christine Haddon-Reece.



A large congregation attended the service, and in addition to the church officers and members, those involved in the execution of the restoration work were also represented and

took part in the service. A fascinating sermon from the Bishop, which ranged from St. Columba via horticulture to tower restoration, was followed by prayers of re-dedication at the foot of the tower and refreshments in the Village Hall.

Although the tower stonework is now finished, there still remains work to be completed on the clock, (which at present gives the correct time twice a day) and the bells. Work is also required on the roof, so further fundraising is on the agenda.

Funds are still available for the clock and bells, although they are insufficient to carry out all the work required and further financing will be required. This work must be carried out to satisfy the terms of the English Heritage grant for the tower restoration and around another £7,000 (more if possible) will probably be required to complete the job.

As for the roof, discussions are taking place with English Heritage regarding grant aid for that work and these have reached Stage 1, which professionally determines the extent of work required.

Affordable Housing for Topcliffe?

Refurbished houses will soon be available for sale at Alanbrooke Barracks. In 1996, Annington Homes purchased 57,600 homes from the Ministry of Defence and these are now gradually being sold at locations all over the U.K.

The sales office at Alanbrooke has been open on Chestnut Avenue since 23rd May and houses will go on sale from 10th June. The initial release will be a number of 2 bedroom terraced and semi-detached homes and one 3-bedroomed semi detached home. These homes all have gas central heating, new front doors & canopies and have carpet & vinyl floor coverings.

Prices have yet to be announced but are likely to be very competitive if those at other locations are anything to go by. If you are interested, more information can be obtained from the site office, by phoning Annington on 0800 358118 or by visiting their website at www.annington.co.uk


