### TOPCLIFFE & ASENBY PRODUCE SHOW RULES

1. Individual exhibitors are responsible for ensuring that they comply with the rules of the Produce Show.
2. Participation in the show is open only to residents of Topcliffe and Asenby, registered owners at Swale Caravan Park and to individuals who grow produce on allotments within the boundaries of either village.
3. Classes 1-78 are open to all. Classes 79-83 are open only to children aged a maximum of 15 years on day of the show.
4. All horticultural exhibits must have been grown by the exhibitor. All entries in hobbies category. Classes 68 to 78 and children's category (Classes 79 to 83) must have been created in or completed within the twelve months prior to the show.
5. No entries are permitted from professional or commercial concerns.
6. All entries should be taken to the Village Hall between 9.00am and 11.30am on the day of the show for registration and tabling. Each entrant will be given a 'show number' and a ticket for each entry. The 'show number' should be written on the reverse of each ticket.
7. An entry fee of 50p will be charged per adult exhibit and 25p per child's entry.
8. Exhibitors are restricted to one entry in any class.
9. Generally, horticultural exhibits must be displayed on napkins supplied on the day by the Produce Show Secretary. Larger exhibits – classes 10, 14, 15, 16, 23 and 38 – are exempted from this rule.
10. Classes 4 to 7 must be displayed on rings (maximum 15mm height).
11. Class 8 – shallots may be exhibited on rings or a bed of sand or both.
12. Classes 25 and 46 – exhibitors must provide their own plain white dinner plate for showing their 'four vegetables' or 'four fruits'. All four exhibits must sit within the circumference of the plate.
13. Watercolour painting exhibits must not exceed 54 x 44cm (22 x 17 inches), including the frame.
14. There is no restriction on the size for paintings in oils or acrylics
15. Photographic exhibits can be in colour or black & white. Maximum size A4 (297 x 210mm). No frames allowed.
16. All exhibitors must leave the village hall by 12 noon. Judging takes place between 12 noon and 2pm.
17. Responsibility for the appointment of judges rests with the Produce Show Secretary.
18. Judges are at liberty to taste entries in the baking section and classes 82 and 83 in the children's section.
19. The judge's decision regarding quality of exhibits is final.
20. Complaints or objections about any matter must be raised with the Produce Show Secretary before 2.30pm on the day of the show. Any disputes will be settled by the Produce Show Secretary, whose decision is final.
21. Certificates will be awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place. The judges may decide to award highly commended certificates.
22. In the horticultural section, 3 points will be awarded for a 1st; 2 for a 2nd and 1 for a 3rd. The exhibitor with most points will win the Produce Show Trophy. The Produce Show Rose Bowl will be awarded to the exhibitor with the most first prizes in the horticultural section.
23. The Arts & Crafts, Baking and Floral trophies will be awarded at the judge's discretion to the exhibitor considered to have made the most outstanding contribution in each relevant section.
24. Each trophy will be inscribed with the winner's name at the Produce Show Committee's expense. The trophies remain the property of the Produce Show Committee and are presented on the understanding that they will be returned by the following show date.
25. Public viewing will be between 2 and 3pm. The Raffle and presentation of the trophies will be at 2.45pm.
26. Exhibits and prize cards can be removed once the trophy presentation is completed.
27. The Produce Show Committee and the Village Hall Committee are not responsible for loss or damage to exhibits or exhibitor's equipment.
